<u>Occasional Offices – Baptisms, Weddings and Funerals, as</u>
well as Personal Individual Private Prayer:

You may have heard in the Government Briefing on Tues-



day that 'Places of Worship' are amongst those parts of

the community that can open as from the 4th July.

The Wardens and the Standing Committee of both Churches met on Tuesday evening using technology and we decided that, although we were very supportive and greatly encouraged by this news, we wanted to do so in a way that was 'safe' for everyone concerned.

We will be guided in this by both the national church and the local Diocese in this, and the Diocese will be meeting on Wednesday to produce Guidelines that will then be published towards the back end of the week. Will then have to work through these, including doing various Risk Assessments etc, so it is likely to be a few weeks yet before we will be able actually to meet physically in the Church Buildings for worship.

We will try and keep everyone posted through New Creation Pew News and in other ways as plans develop, and I would like to thank the Wardens, the Standing Committee and our PCCs for all the work they have already and, no doubt, will be putting in on all our behalves.

Please continue to pray for the whole Church community as we begin to make these arrangements and the necessary changes that will likely to be forthcoming as we emerge from this most unprecedented of times.

Thought for the Week: The Importance of ordinary people taking an active stand. This week has seen us able to open the two Church Buildings for individual Private Prayer.

And I am very grateful to Wardens and others in both church communities for making this possible.

On Friday evening, in Congresbury, we suffered the second break-in and burglary of the Lockdown, whereby two young people somehow managed to prise open the outside door enough to lift the latch break in and take the two Henry hoovers in the cleaning cupboard. They were caught on a neighbour's CCTV camera and Sonya, as one of the Churchwardens is in contact with the Police about the matter.

But what to do? Do we batten down the hatches, close the doors and retreat to safety? Or, do we quietly but resolutely refuse to be intimidated by the poor choices of simply a few, stand, and stay open holding to a bigger vision and a greater call?

In his letter to the Ephesians Paul, in ch 6, talks about the Christian community needing to put on the 'whole armour of God.' He says, "Finally, be strong in the Lord and in His mighty power. Put on the full armour of God, so that you can take your stand against the devil's schemes. For our struggle is not against flesh and blood, but against the rulers, against the authorities, against the powers of this dark world and against the spiritual forces of evil in the heavenly realms. Therefore, put on the full armour of God, so that when the day of evil comes, you may be able to stand your ground, and after you have done everything, to stand." (Ephesians 6:10-13)

This is a 'Thought for the Week' and is not enough time to go too deep into the whole area of 'Spiritual Warfare,' however, as C.S. Lewis, comments in his Introduction to his "Screwtape Letters" (all about the character and nature of Evil – "Screwtape," as he calls him), "too many people are either oblivious to the darker forces and powers of this world, or are fixated by them." Interestingly, Paul likewise, is not so much concerned with "flesh and blood," in simply finding and holding to account the young men who have carried out the burglary and caused the damage, he is concerned also with what reaction it causes within us, and or the ability to combat, and even overcome the spiritual forces that took over the minds and hearts of the young men that justified to them that breaking in and steeling was simply something that they felt would be ok for them to do.

Of these forces, "victim pain" is perhaps the Prince of Demons. "I'm the hurt one round here. I'm the victim." And, even as the innocent, but hurt, 'other party' we can self-justify all manner of evils in self-righteous retribution that we would never consider under any other circumstance. We can see it between two mild mannered neighbours when one accidentally or inadvertently crosses a divide and chews up the grass of the other. Incensed, the fellow neighbour can plot and scheme all manner of imaginary or actual acts of revenge. We can see it between nations, and on the international stage, I will never forget George Bush Jr's speech after 9/11, when he vowed "to go on a crusade, and get those who had done such a hideous act to his nation on his watch." The second Iraq war followed and the rest, in terms of Middle Eastern politics, is in some sense a working out of that perpetuation of all this pain.

So, if kowtowing, and fear is not the way forward, but neither is simply retribution because it continues, if not perpetuates the pain and violence, what is meant to be the Christian response? Paul is quite clear, to focus on the person and character of Jesus, and when all else is done still to be willing to 'stand' – stand in this sense meaning, not to be willing to compromise the nature and character of the Gospel that can change even the hardest or most hurt of hearts either in the other person or in ourselves: honesty,

not giving up on the relationship between us and the other (we can see this as an extension to the interpretation of the word righteousness), even when it would be so much easier to do so creating 'them' and 'us,' and the gospel of forgiveness and seeking peace (forgiveness, the one thing the evil powers of anger and revenge finds undermines themselves the most).

Is this "standing" easy? Of course not, hence the need to pray for the Holy Spirit in prayer to give us the courage and the will to do so. But, as we see so many protests, anger and even violence on our streets as we emerge from Lockdown, what, where and who are we going to put our trust in as we look to the future and the brave new world that we hope will be born from amongst such pain? And what sort Church community do we indeed want to be in order to play our part within it?

I was so humbly proud of our Wardens and Deputy Wardens in Congresbury as I spoke with them this morning. Not one of them said, "we need to shut the Church," or we must get "them," the culprits, responsible for this act, as if retribution masked as 'justice' was the only other option. Each in their own way said pretty much what Paul is saying, "we sort the damage. We gird our loins. We take a sharp intake of breath. Pray, and carry on – standing, with open hands, open hearts and open doors for one and all" in the belief Jesus offers the world and each of us a 'better' way.

Live Stream Church for Sunday: "Continuing the story of being a new Church for a New Age – the story of the "Stump that will arise out of Jesse" (Isaiah ch 11 and the beginning of Ch 12) - part of the journey of walking for 40 day with the Holy Spirit: God's leading - 10.30am

Last week, we looked at the story of the Tabernacle which God told Moses to build in the wilderness (Exodus ch 40) and how it related to the person of Jesus a thousand years later in the great "I AM" sayings we find in John's Gospel, showing how the whole of Scripture and indeed the whole of history point to Jesus: He is the meeting place between Creation and the Creator, all enabled by the constant overseeing and work of the Spirit.
