

Thought for the Week: : "Jesus put this song into our hearts.. What's yours?"

The story of "the Woman at the Well" in John's Gospel (John ch4) has captured people's hearts and minds over the centuries for many reasons: honesty, truth, spiritual encounter, acceptance, redemption, hope. This story has so much to offer both to each of us individually and as a world.



When I was looking into this I discovered that in the Greek language, in which the New Testament was first written, the phrase "in Spirit and in truth," are one and the same. In other words, you cannot worship in Spirit without worshipping in truth, and conversely, you cannot worship in truth without worshipping in the Spirit.

When I first saw the BBC4 programme "The Gospel according to Mica: the story of Gospel Music in six songs" about a month ago I was deeply moved by two things. Firstly, the way the programme shared the story of how Black Gospel music consistently gave voice to the voiceless who held on to hope in the painful struggle of all that many African Americans and Afro Caribbean people in this country have had to go through. And secondly, because of the honesty Mica Paris herself has had to go through, being raised in the Church, loving Gospel music, wanting to take it further, being rejected by the same Church for doing so, spending time beyond the Church, and yet also feeling called to return. And in and through it all never loosing her faith.

Like the Samaritan woman at the well, Mica and the story she tells, is a testimony to "worshipping in true Spirit and truth." And if we are to take Jesus at His word, its where we are all called to aim for, for it is "this worship the Father seeks."

So what does that look like for each of us?

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Well, I hope we all have, or hope we all want to find, a 'favourite' song. And we may have different 'favourite' songs for different occasions. When I try to do 'Dad dancing' in the kitchen on New Year's eve it might be a song like "One step beyond" by the band Madness. When I am having a quiet or reflective time it might be "The Lark Ascending" by Vaughan Williams or "Concierto d'Aranjuez" by Jose Feliciano and in particular the Brass Band version of the same piece taken from the film "Brassed Off." When I'm in a time of praise, it might be any number of songs from Bob Marley to "When I survey the wonderous Cross," although I continually get called back to my first love, "Amazing Grace" either in its original form or in versions like "Blinded by your Grace – Part 2" by Stormzy.

Each song, each piece of music, has particular memories for me, moments when I have turned again to them as the means to give expression to what I am going through, and what I want to find ways to say, to myself, to God, to the world; times of hope, of praise, or of desperation. They have become familiar 'friends' over the years, receptacles of so much of what makes me "me," and therefore also a reflective mirror into what they tell me is truly important to me, that which gives 'life' meaning, as best as I can see it.

Such moments could seem somewhat self-indulgent, after all one person's delight is another person's poison, so to speak. But the experience, although different in content for each one of us, is in fact a shared journey and experience. And it is this journey, this experience that Jesus is saying to the Samaritan woman, and to each of us, is one of the key 'meeting places' between us and God such that it doesn't matter whether we meet on Mt Gerizim or in Jerusalem, whether it's a hymn from a Church hymnbook or something ground-breaking, avante garde, and therefore new. It's the fact that it means something, it carries something of who we are and the fact we bring it as our 'offering' and share it with Him, that matters. This is 'worship.'

So, taking the model of Mica Paris, who in the TV programme both brought her own personal story but also the story of her culture and the cry of her community into the limelight and discovered it to be a place of richness, value, meaning, life and, indeed 'healing,' in the presence of her co-creating and redeeming God, what would we say our story and our songs would be? What would we see as the times and experiences that have led us to choosing these particular songs or music specifically? And what or how do we hear God speaking back His value, His healing, His redeeming love and joy, even in our pain, through them?

For, just as to the Samaritan woman, as we read on and hear later in the story of the woman at the Well, the Messiah, the Christ of the world, the living God, the One who is standing before you, the one who receives every offering of every heart as a song, this One who is listening right now to you and to me, is He (John 4: 26).

Such moments can be a tremendous time of releasing of 'blessing' in the true sense of the word into the world both for you and through you.

Thank you Jesus, for putting all song into our hearts.

<u>Daily Blog – What's happening Next? A Journey into</u> John's Gospel and how Jesus sees the world:

We are coming to the end of our current journey with forty of the Celtic Saints which many people have found valuable and helpful.

We are now going to begin a new chapter and look to explore some NEW material that has not long been released by Tom Wright and his publishing team about how the Gospel and message of Jesus really speaks into our hearts and minds for these modern times that we are going through.

Taking seven themes over the weeks we hope to make the theme itself the key headline talk for the Sunday worship and then follow this up throughout the week by further smaller, five minute talks that will help develop or look at the theme from various other points of view.

And John's Gospel has always been a key text in the Bible for the Celtic Community since the earliest times, with its focus on Creation and the Creator, upon prayer and spirituality, and upon seeing Jesus as Light, as Shepherd, as the One who gives living water and Life.



We are going to take a break for a few days (from Wednesday 2^{nd} – till Saturday 5^{th} September). The first key theme in the new material is about Justice, and is therefore very appropriate at this time. We will introduce in next Sunday's worship (Sun 6^{th} Sept) and then the Daily Blog based on this theme will begin on Mon 7^{th} Sept and be every day following this.

The Ministry Team who help to support the Daily Blog are very much looking forward to sharing this exciting new way of seeing how Jesus and His message have so much to say to us and to our world today.

Kirsty has also kindly made a back catalogue of all the Daily Blogs available on the website in case you would like to go back over any of them.

As the material we will be using is "Online" material there isn't a book as such that accompanies the course. We will try to produce a sheet each Sunday giving an overview of the material for each theme for people who would like to look at some of the key points and issues we will be looking at.

Tom Wright has also written a daily commentary on John's Gospel which would be an alternative or companion resource during this time, "John for Everyone" (comes in two Parts – Part 1 and Part 2). It is available from Eden Christian Bookshop online, Amazon, or on eBook via Amazon Kindle.
