# Thought for the Week: "Finding Hope in tough times."

Some weeks in writing this short piece there has been instantly something good to focus on, people who've done amazing things or, as last week, with the call for "Free School Meals" over half-term, something important to say and which clearly resonates with the Gospel.



"Candle of Hope"

This week feels somehow different. The darkness seems to be closing in somewhat. The clocks have gone back so it's darker earlier. The fixation with Halloween by the media, and even by the news programmes is fairly depressing. The risk of a further Lockdown because the pandemic is escalating, and thereby affecting many more people's lives and livelihoods... Social isolation. Pressure on marginalised groups and upon the NHS. The list goes on. The painful loss of life in the Channel, the assassinations in France, the earthquake in Turkey and, of course, in this week to come we have the American election.

With so much going on, it can seem so very hard to try and remain a person of hope sometimes. It seems such a long time ago now, even a different age, but one of the special moments each year for me is when we have the Christingle service on Christmas eve, and as part of the service we gather in a large circle with our Christingle oranges and bit by bit the candles on top of them are lit, passing "the Light" from one person to another till everyone's candle is lit. Then, we turn all the other lights out, apart from the Christmas tree and there, in the darkness you see each person lit by their Christingle light, lit by the love of Christ coming into the world.

And the image never ceases to take my breath away. It's not only sentimental, even magical. It's the fact that, against the backdrop of the darkness, the Light, "the Light that gives light to everyone," St John calls it (John 1:9), was, and is coming into the world. And this Light never goes away no matter how dark things may become.

One of the other key moments in the Church year when we light candles is at the time of All Souls (traditionally the 2<sup>nd</sup> Nov). On the Sundays around this time, rather than having Halloween and trick or treating, people gather and remember loved ones who have gone before them. Some have sadly have died during this time, others may have died many years ago. Some are old, some are all too young. At the All Souls service each name is read out with dignity and respect and a candle lit for each person, and again, there is that moment, that powerful insight into the fact that even though that person may have gone through "the valley of the shadow of death" as Psalm 23 puts it, the Light of Jesus' love for that person has not been extinguished.

Indeed, they are now part of a great and innumerable congregation each gathered into the presence of the Light, Jesus Himself - the very end of the Bible, the Book of Revelation describes it like this, "The City (the New Jerusalem/heaven) does not need the sun or the moon to shine on it, for the glory of God gives it light, and the Lamb (Jesus) is its lamp." (Rev 21:23). In other words, our destiny is not into darkness but into light, light lit by the one true Light. And all the candles before us physically at all the All Soul's Day services and commemorations the world over, whether inside Churches, or in people's homes, or outside on loved one's

graves, they all act as a signpost and a pointer to this greater and deep reality and truth, that Jesus has indeed brought an incredible and meaningful, tangible Hope to this world, not just two thousand years ago, but also for today. Strangely, in the midst of what should be the deepest sense of darkness, the Light burns ever brighter.

All Souls' Day then becomes then, not just a memory of our loved ones in the past but also a defiant marker and statement to the world "that love wins" even in the darkest of times, for those we love who go before us, but all for us here, now, in this life, in these days however dark they can feel.
