
Discipleship and Journeying with God:

Thought for the Week: "Miracles" are a way of seeing:

A couple of weeks ago, during one particular Sunday morning service, I made a plea over the internet as to whether anyone listening would have the time to be willing to make a banner to support and encourage a colourful "thank you" for our NHS, teaching and other essential workers community. Placing it at the bottom of the Church Drive in Congresbury we hoped that ambulance staff, and others might glimpse it on their way along the A370.





The result was not just one, but three banners. The initial one, beautifully hand painted on a wonderful full length cloth for the bottom of the Church Drive by a kind and talented Congresbury resident, and then two more - one for Banwell, one for Congresbury, produced by the New Creation Staff Team out of their own time, for the boards outside each of the two Churches for all those who pass by.



The kindness, care, skill and generosity shown by all those who have helped bring these banners into being touched me quite deeply, and for which on your behalf I would like to say we are all very grateful.

But could you describe such 'acts of kindness' as "Miracles?"

Often 'religious' people would point to the "miraculous" as being something to do with God and with the Bible: Moses parting the waters of the Red Sea as the Israelites walked through on dry ground as they fled Egypt. Jesus restoring people back to health or even back to life itself in the case of Lazarus or the son of the widow of Nain.

In a broader and more 'popularist' use of the word 'miracle' we can often find journalists of both TV screen and newspaper reaching for the term to explain or describe the unexpected or the unforeseen almost as a way of describing the size, enormity or significance of what has happened or taken place; the unexpected recovery of an individual against all the odds leading to their walking out of hospital, the survival of an individual or home against flood, famine, or fire, the 'miraculous' turn around in the course of fortunes of a team in the case of sport. All these have been described many times in the past and in the present as 'miracles.'

But the creation and display of three signs on three bits of board in a couple of rural villages? Isn't this simply overstating things and going a bit too far?

Well, maybe it depends upon how we choose to measure and to see things.

If we can see a 'miracle' as something that is not just something to do with the Bible and to do with the religiosity of the past, then maybe we can see a God who can be 'at work' just as much today as He was in biblical times. If we can see the point of miracles as being the key thing – that they point to what Jesus called "God's Kingdom," as a place and an attitude that builds people up, that seeks to bring healing, that gives worth and value and importance to this life, particularly to the downtrodden, then maybe we can ease up on our need to focus simply on the size and enormity of a miracle's 'impact' and so rediscover our wonder at the God who works in 'little ways' as well as big, and in 'ordinary' people's lives as well as in the affairs that change the world.

Maybe we can recover a God who not so much 'remote' as many people are feeling in and through all that is going on right now, but a God who is close, and who brings colour, and life, and hope.



For me, this was so beautifully captured on Tuesday evening last week (19th Jan) when a young lady called Lori Marie Key, a young nurse on a CoVid ward in Detroit, Michigan stood on a national, if not an international stage, and sung her heart out with such honesty and humility through the hymn "Amazing Grace" to millions and millions of people as they remembered loved ones at the "Memorial for 400,000 who had died in the United States."

God taking something so 'ordinary' in one sense, a young girl simply singing a song, and yet seeing within her the potential for something and someone to be so extra-ordinary, for such is His good pleasure and something that we still talk about – a bit like turning 'water into wine,' which happens to be our Bible reading for this week (John 2:1-11) and a sign of God revealing Himself to the world not just yesterday, but today, even in the midst of all that we are going through.

May God grant us all, by His Spirit, the ability to see with His eyes His miracles this coming week, however big, or however small, and to wonder at His grace.

TOYBOX

For many years St Andrew's, Congresbury has supported two children through the charity Toybox, a charity committed to ending the global injustice of children living and working on city streets. Toybox began when a couple were prompted by their Christian faith and decided to act. Today they continue, motivated by that same Christian faith, to see a world in which no child is forced to live or work on the streets.

St Andrew's support of two children costs £36 per month (£18 per child per month). We ask members who wish to contribute, to donate £1 per month, paid to the Church account annually (£12). This means that we need 36 members to participate to cover the cost. In 2019 we had 32 individual donors and we thank them for their generosity. Any amount not covered by donations is paid by the Church.

Due to the pandemic we did not collect contributions from members in 2020, meaning that the Church covered the entire cost. As Church finances are limited, we are asking members that have donated in the past to please make their contributions for 2021. If you are also able to give something to defray the costs paid during 2020, that would be greatly appreciated.

This, of course, is not just open to St. Andrew's, Congresbury. Anyone from Banwell who wishes to donate is very welcome and shows a sense of unity between the two churches and New Creation
