Naked Love

We have been travelling through Lent, a period of the Church year when we seek as Christians to strip away the superficial layers and facades we "wear", and seek to find in ourselves the real essential part of each one of us, with all its good parts and failings, and honestly offer that inner being to God for Him to mould and transform it into the image of Jesus. In the process, we often find areas where we are falling short of God's perfect example, our Saviour Jesus. One of the questions we might each ask ourselves at this time is "How pure is my love?" We might well subscribe (at least mentally) to the truth that true love is sacrificial, forgetting self in the service of others, but how close do we get to living that ideal? Hopefully we don't act like the Pharisees whom Jesus berated for their showy acts of pride and vanity when doing some good deed, but perhaps there's still that feeling of "I'd better do this good deed or I'll feel guilty" and an accompanying desire to be seen and recognised doing good. Rather than doing good to others purely for their sake, forgetting about ourselves, we put on the filthy rags of self-congratulation.

Jesus didn't give himself a pat on the back for surrendering to his Father in the Garden of Gethsemane — rather, he submitted his back to the savage tearing lashes of a Roman soldier's scourge. He laid down the glorious garments of the King of Heaven to hang on a cross, stripped of his clothes, his glory and his dignity, with his arms wide open in true, pure, naked love. And so . . . we ask ourselves "How pure is my love? Is it totally selfless, or is it tainted and dirty under the ragged clothes of pride, guilt, false motive or selfdeceit?" At this time of year especially, let's take a good hard look at ourselves in the mirror of God's Word, stripping off all the false layers, and then wonder of wonders, God rushes to embrace us like the prodigal's father, and puts His own robe on us, or as Isaiah puts it, He clothes us in the robes of His righteousness, the garments of true love. bank and

"Therefore, as God's chosen people, holy and dearly loved, clothe yourselves with compassion, kindness, humility, gentleness and patience. Bear with each other and forgive one another if any of you has a grievance against someone. Forgive as the Lord forgave you. And over all these virtues put on love, which binds them all together in perfect unity.
