

Palm Sunday



How to Make a Palm Cross



Maundy Thursday

Jesus and His twelve disciples shared a very special meal called the Passover. This meal had been shared by Jews for hundreds of years ever since the time of Moses and is still celebrated today.

In the evening, when the Passover was ready, Jesus and the twelve disciples sat to eat the meal. The disciples were worried as some people wanted to kill Jesus because he was getting so popular.

Jesus watched His disciples and then He started breaking apart some bread. He thanked God for the bread and shared it with the disciples and said, "Take this and eat it. This is my body which is given for you". Then He took a full cup, thanked God for it and said, "This is my blood, which will be poured out for many people so their sins may be forgiven." They all took a sip from the cup. The meal continued after this and the disciples took their time because they enjoyed talking with Jesus and asking Him questions.

Jesus then got up from the table and put a large towel around Himself to look like a servant. He poured water into a large bowl and began to wash the disciples' feet. Then dried them with the towel that was wrapped around Him. By washing the disciples feet, He was doing something that only a servant would do.

When Jesus had finished washing their feet He said "Do you understand what I have done for you? You call me

'Teacher' and 'Lord,' and that is who I

Celebrating a Passover meal

Passover continues to be celebrated by both Jews and Christians around the world. It tells an incredible story of liberation, freedom and hope. For Christians it reminds us of the Last Supper, the meal Jesus had with His disciples the night before He died and the hope such love brings to the world.

As part of our journey through Easter this year we want to encourage as many people as possible to share in a Passover Feast on Maundy Thursday (1st April). It takes approximately an hour.

We can share in this Passover this year in two ways:

- Either Online—simply join us at 6.00pm when we'll share in an Online Passover Meal live together. All you need is the ingredients: see the New Creation website or Facebook Page.
- Or, if you don't do technology, we have a number of printed out Booklets with full instructions and the story available in each of the Churches. Simply pick up a copy, or get in touch with the Church Office and we will send it to you.

"HEADS UP" about some of the slightly unusual ingredients you will need to get in advance:

For the Seder Plate

Maror - horseradish

Kharoset—(use sweet chutney or honey)

Karpas – parsley (or a bitter herb)

Hard boiled egg

Lamb bone (or substitute a chicken bone)

A bowl of salt water

Fresh water

Matzah crackers

Wine or grape juice

Candle

Napkins

So, why not join try something different, and celebrate the Passover with us this year—Thurs 1st Apr at 6.00pm.

Good Friday

Jesus appeared before Pilate and was sentenced to be crucified.

The soldiers led Jesus into the palace and made Him put on an old royal robe and they twisted together a crown of thorns to put on His head and then they made fun of Him Next, the soldiers led Jesus toward a hill called Golgotha. They made Him carry the cross on His back, but the soldiers had whipped His back and it hurt so much that Jesus couldn't handle the weight of the cross on His shoulders. A man named Simon happened to be near Jesus when He fell, and the soldiers grabbed Him, and made Him carry the cross the rest of the way. When they reached the top of the hill, they nailed Jesus to the cross. There were three crosses: Jesus was in the middle, there was a criminal on His right,

and on His left. Pilate made a sign to be put on the cross it said: Jesus of Nazareth, King of the Jews. Some of the soldiers watched Jesus and made fun of Him; Some people walked by and shouted, "You saved others, why can't you save Yourself?" Jesus could have saved Himself, but He chose not to. He wanted to save us instead. Instead he looked up to heaven and said, "Father forgive them they don't know what they are doing" Later, Jesus could not handle the pain any longer and He said. "It is finished." That is when Jesus bowed His head and died.

Easter Sunday


After Jesus died, a man named Joseph placed Jesus in his tomb that nobody had ever used.

Fill your dish with soil and begin to add your ideas, you can do anything.


You can create mini trees and bushes Paths and borders and gravel areas with seeds and nuts. Decking and paths with dried stalks




Get creative

Easter Rock Painting

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Why does the Easter Bunny bring eggs at Easter?

The Easter exchanging of eggs on Easter Sunday and Easter Bunny are long-standing traditions, but where do they come from?

Similar to celebrating Christmas at the Winter Solstice, decorating trees and receiving gifts from St. Nicholas, it is a welding of Christian and Pagan traditions that have been passed down through the ages.

Rabbits have been associated with spring and fertility since the pre-Christian era (not surprising when rabbits are known to produce several litters in a single year), and the rabbit was even the symbol of Ostara, the pagan Germanic goddess of spring, the dawn and fertility. Ostara, often called Eostre, lends her name to the feast of Easter as it celebrated in springtime.

Ostara was also associated with eggs as they too symbolise fertility and the springtime itself is symbolic of rebirth. Writings from the 17th century in Germany describe the "Oschter Haws" (Easter Hare) for the first time. According to folklore, the Easter Hare would lay colourful eggs in the nests (baskets) of well-behaved children, which sounds very familiar to another tradition that came from Germany. It is thought that German immigrants brought this custom with them, which merged into the chocolate eggs we exchange today.



But how does this link to the Resurrection of Jesus?

As eggs were traditionally seen as symbolic of rebirth, in Christianity they came to symbolise the empty tomb at Eastertide.



Easter eggs, also called Paschal eggs (coming from the Jewish word for Passover) are eggs that are sometimes decorated became gifts given to remember the Resurrection. The oldest tradition is to use dyed and painted chicken eggs and one ancient tradition was the staining of Easter eggs with the colour red to remember the blood of Christ shed at His crucifixion.

This custom of the Easter egg, can be traced back to many sources, but here in Western Europe it became popular during the Middle Ages as a result of the fact that Western Christians were prohibited from eating eggs during Lent, but were allowed to eat them when Easter arrived, so receiving an egg on Easter Day was a welcome gift!

The Easter Bunny and eggs originated as pagan symbols of spring and rebirth. Over the centuries, these ancient symbols became associated with the Christian feast of Easter such that the two traditions have merged together to become what we celebrate today.
