"Living faith – a garden full of wonder."

"8 Among the gods there is none like you, O Lord; no deeds can compare with yours. 9 All the nations you have made will



come and worship before you; they will bring glory to your name. ¹⁰ For you are great and do marvellous deeds; for you alone are God." (Psalm 86:8-10)

On Wednesday of this last week we had an outdoor Communion Service in the Prayer Garden at Congresbury, in part to dedicate a bench for the garden, given in memory of a much-loved former member of the Wednesday communion community – Clarice Lovell.

The English weather was perfect, neither too warm nor too cold; white, fluffy clouds drifted gently across a beautiful blue sky. In the garden, the apple trees are bursting forth, producing an abundance of soon to be ripe apples. Indeed, the growing foliage tickled the ears, and even the noses of one or two of us as we sat round in a circle on benches and the stone seating.

Here we were in God's greatest 'Cathedral' – His creation. And on a near 'perfect' day.

Sharing in worship like this outdoors lends itself to awe and wonder. Whether as part of an organised group, or having a quiet time on our own, we not only can marvel at the height of the ceiling overhead or the breath-taking wonder of the view, there is a long tradition that our prayers and praises actually join in with the ongoing prayer and praise of all of creation itself.

I am reminded of passages such as:

"You will go out in joy and be led forth in peace; and the mountains and hills will burst into song before you, and all the trees of the field will clap their hands. (from Isaiah 55:12)

And "The heavens declare the glory of God; the skies proclaim the work of His hands. Day after day they pour forth speech; night after night they reveal knowledge. They have no speech, they use no words; no sound is heard from them. Yet their voice goes out into all the earth, their words to the ends of the world. In the heavens God has pitched a tent for the sun. It is like a bridegroom coming out of his chamber, like a champion rejoicing to run his course. It rises at one end of the heavens and makes its circuit to the other; nothing is deprived of its warmth." (Psalm 19:1-6)

Reading words such as "nothing is deprived of the sun's warmth" also reminds me of the news this week from our top meteorologists that the recent record-breaking heatwave was exacerbated by up to 4 degrees Celsius because of human use of fossil fuels, which was the key factor leading to not only our 'over-heating' as human beings but also, critically, to the overheating of the earth leading to making grassland and forests so susceptible to 'wild fires' to such devastating effect.

In order to challenge our 'consumerist' approach as human beings to creation, we urgently need to recapture both a biblical and an ancient people's peoples' understanding of the natural world around us and recover our awe and wonder of simply being part of something much bigger than ourselves. I would go as far as to say it is an 'imperative' – i.e. vital, both for creation's sake, but also for ours, re-aligning us with a biblical harmony in which our prayer and praise joins in with the praise of all that lives.*

I never tire of reminding myself, as someone who has recently discovered the wonders of walking the hills, particularly of the Brecon Beacons, "that those hills are there whether I'm there or not. They point to God each day, before I went there, while I was there, and they will be there (God willing) long after I'm gone." So grab yourself a coffee (or a tea). Take yourself outside. Give yourself five minutes. Close your eyes, take in the wonder of the silent song and prayer of all that is as the creation offers its prayer and praise to its Creator each and every day. And after listening, let us join in with offering our own prayer and praise too. You may even like to keep a record, or set yourself a challenge, of different times, places, and weathers where you have joined in with such times of prayer.


Instead of 'getting in the way,' let us 'get in tune' with the mystery and wonder of our Creation's song.
